Deacons and Prison Ministry

Are you looking for a satisfying assignment after ordination or to fill a void in your present ministry? You might consider training for 'Prison Ministry.' After spending nearly a decade serving the men at Southwestern Illinois Correctional Center (SWICC) I can attest it is a humbling, fulfilling, and rewarding assignment. Humbling because for me, I often say, 'but for the grace of God...' (1 Cor 15:10-11). Fulfilling because the men are always looking to God as their redeemer and you bring organization to that quest. Rewarding, because you are the figure that brings a live person to address their questions, or just listen, interpret scripture, teach them to read scripture, and to pray with them and for them. For many, your presence exposes them and brings them into the true faith, through the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) and the Universal Church. Trust me, you will not run out of things to do or challenges to meet in Prison Ministry.

I began my journey after talking with Bishop in Residence Stanley Schlarman, Fr Chris Reuter (deceased), and Mr. Lou Slapshak. At the time they were actively organizing a prisoner outreach program in East St. Louis. They were successful in establishing 'Our Brother's Keepers of Southern Illinois' (<https://obkministry.org>). Fr. Reuter, a Jesuit Priest, headed up the Belleville Diocese Prison Ministry program for many years before his passing in June 2018. He personally built a two-year training program and worked with Lewis University to bring it to fruition. The weekend program that I attended brought together deacons and lay people from every diocese in Illinois. His able assistant, Lou Slapshak walked with him as they represented the men and women incarcerated in Southern Illinois. You will not find many prisons North of Interstate 70. Just saying.

They organized, recruited, and trained prison ministers for the state and local jails to bring the 'Word' and 'Presence' of God to all who were incarcerated. To bring the Word that there was hope for their future and there were people outside the walls that did care and were willing to help. Anyone who would listen would get a complete education on prison ministry from Fr. Chris and Lou. They stressed how important it was for the incarcerated men and women, and how important it is for Christians to live the 'Corporal Works of Mercy' (To visit the imprisoned – Matt 25:31-36; CCC 2447).

WAITING IN THE PEW

What is the role of the Deacon's Wife in Church Ministry.

The role and responsibilities of the ordained Deacon has been well defined within the Catholic Church while still allowing each Deacon the flexibility to form his own individual ministry using his personal skill set, talents and interests. However, there are no clear guidelines or role expectations for the wives of Deacons. While this ambiguity can allow each wife to choose her own personal path, there is the potential for wives of Deacons to feel uncertain about where she fits into Church ministry.

In its most basic definition ministry is in service to others. Most would agree that all Christian wives are serving a ministry by living their best life as a Christian wife and mother, even more evident for the wives of Deacons. A man is called to the diaconate and enters formation with his wife's support. The couple enters formation together. The unique perspective of a female voice can be an underrated benefit to her husband's ministry.

The calling for wives is not so clear or loud. Many wives support their husband's formation, ordination and subsequent ministry but want to find their own contribution. Often this means doing activities. These activities may not necessarily be what they are passionate about but where there is a need.

One Sunday morning not long after Tom's ordination, I was sitting alone in the front pew. An older gentleman walked past and whispered "Aren't you lonely sitting here by yourself?" He made me smile but also reminded me that the congregation is watching me. How do I minister and serve others when I leave that pew?

What is my ministry calling?

One vital truth I discovered is that sitting in that pew is by itself an important ministry. Blessed Mother Teresa, perhaps one of the greatest missionaries to walk this Earth, stated, "Christ prays in me. Christ works in me. Christ thinks in me. Christ looks through my eyes. Christ speaks through my words. Christ works with my hands. Christ walks with my feet. Christ loves with my heart."

All these years I have been too focused perhaps, on doing rather than being. I thought my value was measured by the tangible things people saw me doing. I have finally given myself permission to slow down and just be. Be the prayer the Church needs, be the wife my husband deserves, be me. Giving myself these permissions has brought me deeper and more meaningful faith. Of course doing is not bad either. While most of us cannot give with the tenacity of Mother Teresa, we still want to do more.

There is no cookie cutter version of the perfect Deacon's wife. She is a gift to the Church because of her unique individuality and gifts. Finding your ministry calling is challenging. Here are a few suggestions that may help.

- Discover your passion. Do what you love and fits into your lifestyle. Sometimes this means saying no.
- Try new things. Fear of failure holds us back too many times. Initially I was afraid to write this article. Scripture helped me have the courage and faith to say yes. "At all times bless the Lord, your God, and ask him that all your paths may be straight and

all your endeavors and plans may prosper."

- Continue your own education. This can be informal or taking advanced college classes. There are many Theology degrees open to women and more women are filling Lay Ministry roles.
- Be patient with yourself. Opportunities tend to present themselves.
- Discuss your thoughts with your husband. Make sure he knows you are not asking him for solutions.
- Pray! Invite God into your discernment.

Each of us is a ministry in action. Our ministry evolves over time. Alexander Men, an Orthodox Priest and Martyr, stated before his death, "Don't worry about me. I am only an instrument that God is using for the moment. Afterwards, things will be as God wants them." And don't forget that waiting in the pew speaks volumes.
