The role of deacons holds profound significance in the life of the Church, serving as a beacon of Christ's servant-leadership. Through their dedication, they minister to the marginalized, exemplify charity, and bring the Gospel to life through their actions.

Deacons are entrusted with the sacred tasks of proclaiming the Word, assisting at the altar, and distributing the Eucharist. But perhaps their most crucial role is to mirror Christ the Servant, reminding all believers that to serve one another is to serve Christ Himself.

WELCOME MARTINA SKORCH TO THE VOCATION AND DEACON FORMATION TEAM

We are thrilled to share some wonderful news with you all. We have recently welcomed Martina Skorch to our team as the new Administrative Assistant for Vocation and Deacon Formation! Martina is currently serving as the high school youth minister for Perry County, a role in which she has demonstrated exceptional dedication and leadership. Her skills and passion have come highly recommended, making her an outstanding addition to our team.

In addition to her responsibilities with us, Martina will also contribute her talents to the Department of Life, Marriage, and Family for 12 hours each week. The remainder of her time will be dedicated to supporting our missions in Vocations and Deacons, ensuring that we have the full benefit of her expertise and enthusiasm. Martina's office will be located on the second floor of the Chancery.

 Are you being called to be a Permanent Deacon?

The Office of Permanent Deacon is considering starting a new class of aspirants in fall 2025. Eligibility is extended to men aged thirty-three to fifty-six by September 2025. Men older than fifty-six may still apply but require special approval from the Deacon Formation Office and the Bishop.

The formation process is a five-year commitment, including academic studies conducted by St. Meinrad School of Theology, spiritual direction, and learning about the deacon's role. Participants are required to attend a three-day meeting once per month over the course of the five year program. Interested individuals should first discuss their interest with their pastor. For those unable to attend the initial meeting, another session will be scheduled later. This meeting is an opportunity to learn about the process and requirements for becoming a Permanent Deacon in the Diocese.


